




Campus Map of SC Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities - Sessions Location

Volodymyr Vynnytsky

Internationally renowned pianist Volodymyr Vynnytsky is laureate of the Marguerite Long-Jacques Thibaud International Piano Competition in Paris. Volodymyr Vynnytsky has performed with the leading orchestras of Ukraine, Poland, the United States, South Africa and many others.

He has appeared in many prestigious concert halls, including Carnegie Hall, Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, Merkin Concert Hall, Steinway Hall, the Great (Bolshoi) Hall at the Moscow Conservatory, St. John's Smith Square in London, Teatro Santa Isabel in Recife, Brazil, Linder Auditorium in Johannesburg and Baxter Theatre Centre Concert Hall in Cape Town, South Africa among many others.

Volodymyr Vynnytsky has also earned a reputation of a brilliant chamber music performer, appearing with such noted ensembles as the Kyiv Chamber Orchestra "Perpetuum Mobile," and Zapolsky String Quartet from Denmark. He has also performed at numerous musical festivals, including Piccolo Spoleto in Charleston and the Music and Art Center of Greene County, where he has served as artistic advisor and resident pianist since 1996.

Born in Lviv, Ukraine, Volodymyr Vynnytsky studied at the Lviv Music School for Gifted Children and later at the Moscow Conservatory. After earning his doctorate in 1983 from the Moscow Conservatory, he taught at the Kyiv Conservatory and concertized extensively throughout Ukraine, the other republics of the former Soviet Union, Europe, USA, Canada, Central America and South Africa.

In October 2008 Volodymyr Vynnytsky was awarded a title – Honorary Professor of Lviv State Academy of Music, Ukraine; on May 2010 – Honorary Professor of Odesa State Music Academy, Ukraine.

Ted Cooper

Ted Cooper is a piano teacher and a composer of educational music for the piano. Ted"s interest in composing grew out of his teaching experience and the need for effective repertoire for his students.

Ted"s compositions are published by Alfred and Carl Fischer. His most recent works, *Autumn Moon, Noche del Gitano* and *Around the World on 88 Keys*, Books 1 and 2 are published by Alfred, as is a four-volume series of duets for student and teacher titled *Side by Side*, co-authored with Amy Glennon. His compositions are included on the festival lists of the National Federation of Music Clubs and the Music Teachers Association of California

Since 2003, Ted has been a faculty member at the Levine School of Music in Washington, DC, where he maintains a full-time teaching schedule. Before moving to Washington, he spent 14 years at the New School for Music Study as faculty member, and later Educational Director and Director.

Ted is a frequent conference speaker. He has presented numerous years at the Music Teachers National Association Conference. Videotapes of his teaching have been featured at the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy in Chicago.

As an author, he has contributed articles to *Keyboard Companion*, and has served as educational consultant for the *Frances Clark Library for Piano Students*. He is a recipient of the Group Piano Teaching Award presented jointly by the Music Teachers National Association and the National Piano Foundation.

Ted earned his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Western Illinois University. He also earned a Professional Teaching Certificate with distinction from the New School for Music Study, where he was a student of Frances Clark and Louise Goss.

Barbara Rice Goldberg

Barbara Rice Goldberg has an honors degree in Piano Performance from the University of Connecticut where she also studied voice, theory and composition. She obtained an early education degree from Hunter College in New York City, and an associate degree in Management of Non-Profit Organizations while at NYSCA.

Her music career includes music directing, conducting or accompanying over 50 musical theater/cabaret shows in New York and Florida. Her management career includes the business management of four arts organizations: theater, dance, chamber and choral.

In the early 1960's Ms. Goldberg produced her own radio program on WNCN in New York City: Barbara Gold's Womens News and Interviews. She was one of the earliest women in FM radio. She also spent 5 years working in the airline industry, first with American Airlines, then as Manager of Counter Services at the three Airlines Terminal Buildings in Manhattan. After marriage, the Goldbergs moved to Croton-on-Hudson in Westchester County, NY, where she reared her two children, taught piano and became one of the founders of the Croton Council of the Arts.

As her father was a composer, writing music seemed a natural thing to do. Ms. Goldberg holds over 300 copyrights on material ranging from choral work, art songs, and childrens ballet to piano teaching material from elementary to advanced levels. She publishes and sells her own music under the name Rice Publishing. Since "retiring" to Port Charlotte, Florida, twenty years ago, she continues to teach voice, composition and piano at her home studio. Ms. Goldberg has two daughters and three remarkable grandchildren.

Memberships include MTNA, ASCAP, Phi Kappa Phi honorary society, and various local writing and performing organizations.

Julianne Miranda, NCTM

Julianne M. Miranda, NCTM, CPCC is Senior Director, Center for Academic Technology and Associate Professor of Music at Butler University. A respected clinician and educator, she has been a frequent presenter at state, national and international conferences on topics including personal and corporate leadership, curricular integration of information technology, wellness for musicians and life management/ personal growth. She is a Certified Professional Coactive Coach and serves as a consultant to colleges, universities, and non-profit organizations, focusing primarily on strategic planning, academic improvement and program assessment.

From 1994-2006 she was associate professor of music at DePauw University where she taught courses in piano, music technology and wellness for musicians. She received a Master of Music in Piano Performance from the Indiana University School of Music where she studied with Karen Shaw and Menahem Pressler.

Julianne was most recently the Chief Information Officer and Deputy Executive Director for the Music Teachers National Association, where she was responsible for all aspects of IT. She worked closely with state and local affiliates to help them successfully leverage technology. While there, she conceived the development of a web content management system for the affiliates which was recently trademarked.

She has received a number of grants and awards for her work in information and instructional technology and has spoken and written on a wide range of topics including classroom and technology lab support; instruction for the visually impaired, web design, teaching with technology in the sciences, and life management strategies for busy teachers.

She holds a master of music in piano performance and literature degree from the Indiana University School of Music. \Box





As a promoter of teaching composition in the studio, Diane has been invited to present composition sessions to pedagogy classes at universities and colleges, to teachers in local associations, and at state MTA Conferences. Her composition students have won first place prizes in state, regional, national and international competitions, and several of these compositions have been published in the national *Piano Explorer* magazine, sponsored by *Clavier Companion* magazine.

Diane received the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) Foundation Fellow Award in 2007.
