

Lucille Chung

Lucille Chung made her debut at the age of ten with the Montréal Symphony Orchestra and Charles Dutoit. Since then, she has performed an extensive concerto repertoire with over 65 leading orchestras such as the Philadelphia Orchestra, Moscow Virtuosi, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, Flemish Radio Orchestra, Orquesta Sinfónica de Bilbao, Staatskapelle Weimar, Philharmonie de Lorraine, Orchestra Sinfonica Siciliana, Belgrade Philharmonic, and the Seoul Philharmonic.

As a recitalist, Lucille Chung has performed in over 35 countries in prestigious venues such as the Wigmore Hall in London, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, the Dame Myra Hess Series, the Concertgebouw, the Franz Liszt Academy and the Palais des Beaux-Arts.

Chung graduated from both the Curtis Institute of Music and The Juilliard School before she turned twenty. She furthered her studies in London with Maria Curcio-Diamand, at the "Mozarteum" in Salzburg with Karl-Heinz Kämmerling, and received the Konzertexam Diplom from the Hochschule "Franz Liszt" in Weimar, where she worked with the late Lazar Berman. She also graduated from the Accademia Pianistica in Imola, Italy with the honorary title of "Master" and from the SMU Meadows School of the Arts under Joaquín Achúcarro where she is now on the faculty.

Lucille Chung has been hailed as "a considerable artist, admirable for her bold choice of music" by *The Sunday Times* for her recordings of the complete piano works by György Ligeti on the Dynamic label.

Lucille is fluent in French, English, Korean, Italian, German, and Russian. She and husband, pianist Alessio Bax make their home in New York City with their daughter, Mila, and are artistic co-directors of the Dallas-based Joaquín Achúcarro Foundation.

Conference Speaker



Ingrid Jacobson Clarfield

Ingrid Jacobson Clarfield, nationally recognized teacher, clinician, pianist, and author is Professor of Piano and Coordinator of the Piano Department at Westminster Choir College of Rider University in Princeton, New Jersey. She has directed Westminster Choir College's Piano Week for High School Students since 1984.

Ms. Clarfield has given lecture-recitals, workshops and master classes in more than a hundred cities across North America, including many presentations at state and national MTNA conferences. She has presented numerous master classes and pedagogy sessions at the National Conference of Keyboard Pedagogy, the TCU/Van Cliburn Institute, the National Piano Teachers Institute, the Music Teachers Association of California, World Piano Pedagogy Conference, and the Calgary Arts Summer School in Alberta, Canada.

Clarfield's life is the subject of a new documentary entitled *Take A Bow*. It tells her inspirational life story depicting her tenacious fight back to teaching after a devastating stroke in 2007. In 2009 she was the first recipient of the Teacher of the Year Award from the New Jersey MTA. Ms. Clarfield has authored numerous collections for Alfred Publishing Company.

Ms. Clarfield holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Oberlin College where she studied with John Perry. She also holds a Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music.

Ms. Clarfield maintains an independent studio in Princeton, New Jersey. Her students have performed concertos with several orchestras, were featured on NPR's "From the Top" and have won top honors in state, national, and international competitions sponsored by the MTNA, International Young Artist Piano Competition, the Steinway Society, and numerous others.



Presenter

Sarah Ernst

Sara M. Ernst, PhD, NCTM, is an active piano pedagogue, teacher of all ages, and pianist, and serves as Assistant Professor of Piano and Piano Pedagogy at the University of South Carolina. Prior to her position at USC, she worked at the New School for Music Study in New Jersey as the Administrative Director and an instructor of piano lessons and group classes.



Dr. Ernst received a PhD in music education with an emphasis in piano pedagogy from the University of Oklahoma. She completed her dissertation on the teaching philosophy of Mr. Marvin Blickenstaff, a widely admired piano teacher.

Dr. Ernst's research in piano pedagogy includes investigating teaching effectiveness, the use of language in instruction, and successful parent-teacher interactions. She is an adjudicator for the Music Development Program as a member of the College of Examiners of the Royal Conservatory of Music (Toronto). In addition, Dr. Ernst has served as an anthology and syllabus reviewer for the Royal Conservatory of Music and a reviewer for the American Music Teacher and Clavier Companion. She also serves on the committee for the young professional and pedagogy student of the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy.

Steven Brundage is a doctoral candidate studying piano pedagogy at the University of South Carolina. He is the founder and director of Green Willow Academy, a music teacher co-operative in Greenville, South Carolina. His writing is featured in such publications as American Music Teacher, Clavier Companion and College Music Society Symposium.

Tom Dempster

Thomas Dempster is a composer writing predominantly chamber, electroacoustic, and multimedia works. With over 70 completed works to his name, his output ranges from solo miniatures to extended works for orchestra with soloists. His music bears accessible yet decidedly individualistic traits, from tonal references to extended techniques, from touching on classical forms to experimental soundscapes and video works. His music has been performed widely throughout North America and Europe.

Dempster serves as an Assistant Professor of Music at South Carolina State University in Orangeburg, SC, where he teaches courses in music technology, composition and theory, and music business. He directs the BulldogBytes Concert Series at SC State, an annual concert series devoted to experimental and digital music. He is an assistant editor with Jasper magazine, a contributor to the new music digest, I Care If You Listen, and an album reviewer for the Society for Electroacoustic Music in the United States. He has given lectures on musical aesthetics, intellectual property issues, and musical analysis at CMS, NYCEMF, and SCMEA conferences. He studied at the University of Texas (MM, DMA) with Kevin Puts, Dan Welcher, and Russell Pinkston, and at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (BM) with Eddie Bass, Craig Walsh, and Frank McCarty. He studied bassoon with Michael Burns, has performed with many orchestras throughout the Southeast, and is a proponent of extended performance techniques for the bassoon.

Dempster resides in the Columbia area with his wife, visual artist Kara Gunter. When not teaching, composing, bassooning, or otherwise musicking, Dempster can be found tending to his lush gardens or thumbing through the various books that have taken over his house. Pianist Jacob Clark received his musical education primarily in Texas, completing his BM, MM, and DMA in piano performance at the University of Texas. Dr. Clark joined the faculty of Lamar University in the fall of 2014 as Assistant Professor of Piano, specializing in applied and group instruction. Previous faculty appointments include assistant professor at South Carolina State University, adjunct instructor at Northern Virginia Community College and piano instructor at the prestigious Levine School of Music in Washington D.C. An active performer, he has presented recitals in venues throughout the US.



Sujung Cho

Pianist Sujung Cho is a native of Korea, where she was an honor scholarship graduate at Ewha Womans University in Seoul. She holds her master's degree in Piano Performance and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano Performance from the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music. Dr. Cho has appeared in internationally and nationally acclaimed music competitions and festivals in the United States, Korea, China, and Germany. Dr. Cho joined the faculty of Claflin University in the fall of 2011 and currently serves as Assistant Professor of Piano/Staff and Choir Accompanist.


