

Improvisation is one of the most valuable tools in the piano teacher's teaching arsenal. It functions as a vehicle through which students can be exposed to concepts such as imagery and character that would otherwise be above their current ability levels. Although it can sometimes be intimidating to implement, improvisation can greatly enhance the teaching of artistry. This presentation explores practical and creative methods and strategies for teaching artistic concepts through improvisation that can easily and effectively be incorporated in the private piano lesson.

Fred Karpoff

Fred Karpoff has performed as both soloist and collaborative pianist on four continents, including prominent venues in Germany, Luxembourg, Belgium, Ghana, Zimbabwe, Ireland, Finland, Italy, China, and the United States. As guest artist at major music festivals in the U.S. and Europe, he has collaborated with many of America's foremost musicians.

A former Artistic Ambassador for the United States Information Agency, Fred Karpoff is a prize winner in the San Antonio, Frinna Awerbuch, Dublin, and 2005 Competition Internationale piano competitions. In addition to his critically acclaimed CD release, *Heroic Tales: Piano Music of Edward MacDowell*, Renegade Classics has issued his live Beethoven Trio performances with musicians at the Skaneateles Festival and *This Moment* and *Snapshots* with soprano Rebecca Karpoff.

Fred Karpoff studied with Ann Schein, Yoheved Kaplinsky, and Robert Weirich, and holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Peabody Conservatory, where he was a frequent performer in the master classes of Leon Fleisher.

He is the 2011 Winner of the Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award presented by MTNA for the 3-D Piano method. This multi-DVD series and book on a whole-body approach to piano playing and teaching is already in use by hundreds of pianists and teachers in over twenty countries. Dr. Karpoff presents workshops and master classes throughout the U.S., including recent appearances as a featured presenter at the California MTA and Texas MTA conventions, and the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy.

He is Professor of Piano and Ensemble Arts and co-chair of the keyboard department at the Setnor School of Music at Syracuse University. Dr. Karpoff is a Steinway Artist.

Marvin Blickenstaff

Marvin Blickenstaff is known among piano teachers throughout the country for his teaching, lecturing, performing, and publishing. For sixteen summers he was on the faculty of the International Workshops where he performed and lectured in Canada, Austria, Scotland, Norway, France, and Switzerland. In 1995 and again in 2004, The Registered Piano Teachers of New Zealand sponsored him in concert and workshop tours of that country.

The "Marvin Blickenstaff Endowment Fund" was established in his honor by the Music Teachers National Association Foundation, and he was named "Teacher of the Year" by the Indiana MTA. In 2007 the on-line journal Piano Pedagogy Forum published tributes to Blickenstaff honoring his contribution to piano teaching in America. Also in 2007 he was named Fellow of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

He was honored in 2009 with MTNA's highest honor, the MTNA Achievement Award, and was selected in 2013 by the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy for its Lifetime Achievement Award.

Formerly head of the piano departments at the University of North Carolina/Chapel Hill and Goshen College (IN), he has taught on the faculties of the Westminster Choir College and The College of New Jersey. Currently he maintains a private studio in the Philadelphia area and teaches at The New School for Music Study in Princeton. Blickenstaff is former Board President of the Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy and is on the Executive Planning Committee of the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy.

May Lauren Brinkman has been teaching private piano lessons since 2007. She graduated magna cum laude from Furman University with a Bachelor of Arts in History and Music. While at Furman, she studied piano with Dr. David Gross and pedagogy with Mrs. Ann Guest. May Lauren then earned a Master of Music in Performance with an Emphasis in Piano Pedagogy from the University of Georgia. While at UGA, she studied piano with Dr. Martha Thomas and pedagogy with Dr. Pete Jutras.



May Lauren is a member of the Music Teachers National Association, the South Carolina Music Teachers Association and the Greenville Music Teachers Association. She is also a member of the National Federation of Music Clubs, South Carolina Federation of Music Clubs and the local affiliat, Greenville Woman's Music Club.

May Lauren actively participates in these organizations by presenting continuing education sessions for teachers and volunteering at competitions and festivals for students. She currently serves on the SCMTA state board as the MTNA Foundation Fund Chair. She is Recital Chair and President-elect of the Greenville Music Teachers Association.

Scott Price is Professor of Piano and Piano Pedagogy and area coordinator of piano studies at the University of South Carolina. He is a recipient of the Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award given by MTNA, is an MTNA Foundation Fellow, and is the winner of the 2012 Southeastern Conference Faculty Achievement Award for the University of South Carolina. He is internationally recognized for his work in teaching piano to students with special needs.

Dr. Jon Jeffrey Grier holds a DMA in composition from the University of South Carolina and since 1988 has been Instructor of Music Theory, Music History, and Composer in Residence at the Greenville Fine Arts Center. SCMTA is commissioning a work entitled "Security Lapses" for woodwind trio that explores some of the technology glitches that are so prevalent in today's news, e.g. leaks, hacks, bugs, and moles. The PEN Trio will be the guest artists debuting Dr. Grier's work.

Performers—PEN Trio



The members of PEN Trio are passionate about performance, education and scholarship, and the group is dedicated to expanding the scope of the traditional trio d'anches as well as to bring the intimate yet intense sound of this unique instrumentation to a wider audience. The term trio d'anches was coined by bassoonist Fernand Oubradous in 1927 to describe the now legendary Trio d'Anches de Paris. This celebrated group featured the three reed instruments commonly found in the orchestra: oboe, clarinet and bassoon. Popular mythology asserts that the group came together to explore a more perfect blend of timbres known as "une parfaite homogénéité," that is not available to the standard woodwind quintet instrumentation, which includes the distinct and varied timbres of flute and horn.

Donna Sanders has been teaching piano lessons to students in North Carolina and South Carolina for 41 years. Many of her students have chosen music careers in areas of church music, music education, professional accompanying and private piano studio teaching.

After moving to Myrtle Beach in 2003 she worked with State President Deborah Freeman to establish a Myrtle Beach district for pre-college auditions. In 2005 she and Kathleen Nungesser organized a local association of MTNA/SCMTA in Myrtle Beach, the Long Bay Music Teachers Association.

On the state level, she has served SCMTA as MTNA Junior Auditions Chair, District VIII Pre-College Auditions Chair, and on the local level as President of LBMTA and currently as Treasurer and Vice-President for Membership. During her 29 years in North Carolina, she also served NCMTA in many capacities.

She is North Carolina Whiteville District Gold Cup Chairman for National Federation of Music Clubs and a National Guild of Piano Teachers judge. Other professional involvements include UNCG Summer Music Camp piano faculty for 22 years and master class clinician for piano teachers groups in North Carolina and South Carolina. Her articles have been included in Marvin Blickenstaff's "Repertoire and Rhythm" editorial sections of *Keyboard Companion*. Nationally certified by MTNA as a teacher of music (NCTM), she holds the Permanent Professional Certificate.

Mrs. Sanders received a Bachelor of Music degree from Greensboro College where she studied with David Pinnix and also attended UNC-Chapel Hill where she did additional studies in musicology with William S. Newman and piano with Marvin Blickenstaff.

She and her husband Rod live in Myrtle Beach. They have two adult sons, one living in New York City who is VP of a costume design company and the other a veterinarian in Los Angeles.


