

#### **Anton Nel**

Anton Nel, winner of the first prize in the 1987 Naumburg International Piano Competition at Carnegie Hall enjoys a remarkable and multifaceted career that has taken him throughout the world. Following an auspicious debut at the age of twelve with Beethoven's C Major Concerto after only two years of study, the Johannesburg native captured first prizes in all the major South African competitions while still in his teens, toured his native country extensively and became a well-known radio and television personality. Coming to the United States in 1983, he attended the University of Cincinnati, where he pursued his Masters and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees.

Mr. Nel's nearly four decades of concertizing include performances with orchestras worldwide. (He has an active repertoire of more than 100 works for piano and orchestra.) He is an acclaimed Beethoven interpreter. He has performed recitals in major concert halls nationally and internationally. Possessing an encyclopedic chamber music and vocal repertoire, he has, over the years, regularly collaborated with many of the world's foremost string quartets, instrumental soloists and singers.

He was appointed to the faculty of the University of Texas at Austin in his early twenties, followed by professorships at the Eastman School of Music, and the University of Michigan. At the University of Texas, Anton Nel teaches an international class of students and now heads the Division of Keyboard Studies.

His recordings include four solo CDs, several chamber music recordings (including the complete Beethoven Piano and Cello Sonatas and Variations, and the Brahms Sonatas with Bion Tsang), and works for piano and orchestra by Franck, Fauré, and Saint-Saëns.

Anton Nel became a citizen of the United States on September 11, 2003. He is a Steinway artist.

#### **Diane Hidy**

Diane Hidy is a pianist, teacher, and composer. Her website, DianeHidy.com is visited by thousands of teachers each month for practical advice. Her helpful and humorous writing inspires teachers world-wide. As a composer, she has become known for her four books of Attention Grabbers—books written specifically with children with learning differences in mind. Her ever-popular piece "Mashed Potato Clouds" appears on recitals around the world.

Ms. Hidy made her Carnegie Hall debut following her studies with John Perry and Leon Fleisher. She was the first woman Fellow of the American Pianist Association and won the national MTNA Collegiate Artist Award. Diane attended The Juilliard School of Music and holds music degrees from the University of Southern California and the Peabody Conservatory of Music. She has more than 50 recordings of standard piano teaching repertoire available on the Neil A. Kjos label and now available on iTunes. She recently continued her collaboration with Jane Bastien, recording the newest Bastien Piano Literature, Volume 6.

With Keith Snell, she co-wrote *Piano Town*, a method for beginning piano students. The series features abundant supplementary materials: Christmas, Halloween books and sheet music solos.

Diane lives in San Francisco and has two grown children. Her private students range in age from 6 years to 84 and she loves teaching them all.

#### **Derek Parsons**

From his orchestral debut at age 12, Derek Parsons has been performing for appreciative audiences in a career spanning four decades. His concerts include the United States, Canada, Spain, Italy and China. He has been heard on South Carolina Educational Television and Radio, CBC Radio and Television in Canada. His repertoire encompasses a wide spectrum of styles, genres, and periods.



Dr. Parsons holds degrees and diplomas in Performance Studies from the University of Western Ontario, the University of Michigan, and Trinity College of Music, England. Dr. Parsons has enjoyed a long association with SCMTA, has performed on several conference programs, and has held many offices, including President from 2010-2012.

In addition to his teaching duties at Furman, Dr. Parsons serves as Professor of Piano and Keyboard Area Coordinator Director of the Furman University Summer Keyboard Institute.

He is best known in the Greenville area for his annual performance of Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue at Furman's Concerts by the Lake series.

Scott Price is Professor of Piano and Piano Pedagogy and area coordinator of piano studies at the University of South Carolina. He is a recipient of the Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award given by MTNA, is an MTNA Foundation Fellow, and is the winner of the 2012 Southeastern Conference Faculty Achievement Award for the University of South Carolina. He is internationally recognized for his work in teaching piano to students with special needs.

Daniel Musselman, an active composer in west Tennessee, currently serves as Acting Department Chair and Director of Choral Activities at Union University. In his writing, he seeks to balance the depth of tradition with the breadth of modern technique. His music is influenced by the works of Barber, Bartok, and Arnold among others.

Ann Wilson is an independent teacher of piano performance, piano pedagogy and music theory. She holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in piano pedagogy, a Master of Music in piano pedagogy and a Bachelor of Arts in piano from the University of South Carolina where her principal teachers were Bong Hi Kim, Max Camp and Charles Fugo. Dr. Wilson taught piano and piano pedagogy at the University of South Carolina and was an instructor in the USC School of Music's Summer Workshops.

Dr. Wilson has served as an adjudicator for piano competitions throughout the southeast and a curriculum author and faculty member for collegiate seminars, workshops and music camps. She is the author of several research documents, including A Review of Applied-theory and Ear-training Concepts in Piano Method Series for Young Beginners, and Supplementary Literature for Elementary Age Students of Beginning Piano Methods based on The Six Stages of Complexity as Presented by Max W. Camp.

Students of Dr. Wilson have been selected to perform in numerous master classes and chosen for participation in leading competitions and summer programs of study, including the Southeastern Piano Festival and the Lyceum International Piano Series.

Professional service has included presidency of the South Carolina Piano Festival Association and the Columbia MTA. Dr. Wilson is currently State Festival Chairman of the South Carolina Piano Festival Association, a member of Columbia MTA, MTNA and Pi Kappa Lambda. She is associate director of music ministries at Christ Church of the Carolinas in Columbia and accompanist for the professional chamber choir, Colla Voce, under the direction of Dr. Larry Wyatt.

A resident of Lexington, South Carolina, Dr. Wilson is married to Harry Wilson, whose collegiate studies were in vocal performance. The Wilsons' two daughters, Victoria Wilson Boyce and Ann Forrest Wilson Bowers, also hold degrees in music.

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#### **Three Tales for Four Hands**

The 2017 SCMTA call for composers sought for a piece to fill a pedagogical need—chamber music including piano on an accessible level. Daniel Musselman, 2017 Commissioned Composer, has met this very successfully with "Three Tales for Four Hands." Scored for lower-advanced piano duet with narrator, the pieces incorporate touches of literary humor, as well as musical humor. The writing is modern, but accessible to young pianists, and delightful from start to finish. The narrations are stories about animals that end with a moral: The Turtle and the Ducks, The Bear and the Bees, The Wolf and the Kid. The work will be performed by two talented pre-college students of SCMTA member Julie Carrier. The narrator is Dr. Lorri Turcios, also an SCMTA member and VP for Programs of the Greenville MTA.

Lily Fonte, student of Julie Carrier, is 17 years old and a senior in high school. She began piano lessons at age 6 and loves being an accompanist for both classical and sacred music. Lily has placed in competitions such as the GMTA Lawrence Hamilton Morton Scholarship Auditions and the Bob Jones University High School Fall Festival. She performed at the state SCFMC Junior Day concert in May 2016. Lily has also performed for several masterclasses and has competed in the SCGSAH junior artist piano competition. She plays viola in the Young Artist Orchestra with the Greenville County Youth Orchestras. Next fall Lily plans to pursue a music degree in piano performance at Bob Jones University.

Joy Fonte, student of Julie Carrier, is 14 years old and began taking piano lessons at the age of five. Joy has a love for sharing music with others by playing at nursing homes, churches, and recitals. She has participated in the annual NFMC, SCMTA, and the GMTA Skills Festival auditions for several years, achieving top ratings. Joy also has a love for the violin, and is a member of the Young Artist Orchestra.

**Dr. Lorri Conder Turcios** is an associate professor of piano and piano pedagogy at Bob Jones University. She holds a bachelor's degree in piano pedagogy and master's degree in piano performance from BJU as well as a master's degree in piano pedagogy from Southern Methodist University. In 2015, she completed an EdD in Curriculum and Instruction with concentrations in music and piano pedagogy. Her dissertation was titled "An Investigation of the Effects of Cognitive Chunking Practice on the Sight-

reading Achievement of University Non-major Group Piano Students." She is the BJU music department's resident specialist in musicians' injuries—giving lectures and actively counseling musicians with pain and technical issues from both BJU and the Greenville area. As chair of the GMTA Piano Skills Festival committee, her responsibilities include curriculum planning, document preparation and organizing the yearly event.

With her wealth of personal and professional experience, Hidy will give teachers practical tips to help understand and teach these wonderfully challenging students.




