Congratulations to this year's recipient Inga Agrest!

Inga Agrest started playing piano when she was four years old under the supervision of her mother, Marina Agrest. At age 5, Ms. Agrest was accepted to the St. Petersburg's School of Music (St. Petersburg, Russia). Upon immigrating to the US at age 13, she continued to pursue piano with her mother and participated in many recitals and competitions in the area including as a soloist with the Long Bay Youth Orchestra of Myrtle Beach. Ms. Agrest started teaching piano at age 15 by occasionally substituting for her mother and then officially taking a teaching position at a local music school at age 17 upon starting her undergraduate studies at the College of Charleston.

Ms. Agrest has a BA degree in Piano Performance & Composition from the College of Charleston, and MM degree in Opera/Theater Directing from the University of South Carolina. She also studied voice and participated in all the Vocal and Opera ensembles during both undergraduate and graduate studies. Ms. Agrest had worked as a Director, Assistant Director and Stage Manager for shows and operas in Charleston and Columbia, SC, Los Angeles and Italy. Ms. Agrest has taught general music at schools in Los Angeles, CA as well as private piano and voice lessons after finishing her degrees. She has also spent time teaching in Minnesota for about a year. However, she keeps coming back to Charleston where the majority of her family lives. Ms. Agrest teaches private piano, voice, composition and Musical Theatre Classes in the Charleston area. She has been the Musical Director with SPROUTS Children Theatre and in local Theaters, as well as, at the College of Charleston. Ms. Agrest has sung with local Opera Companies, and has been singing with choirs her entire life ranging in locations from St. Petersburg, Russia to Charleston, SC. Locally, she has sung with Taylor Festival Choir, CofC Concert Choir, Madrigal Singers, CSOC and CSO Chamber as well as several church choirs, synagogues and at the Spoleto Festival USA.

Ms. Agrest has been an active member of the MTNA, SCMTA and CMTA for about 25 years and has been an active board member both at local and state levels serving in a variety of positions. For the past decade, her major goal has been to open her own Multi-Cultural Academy for the Creative Arts, which is finally open in a new space. Ms. Agrest is thrilled to receive the Genesis Grant Award to help her with this transition.

CLAYTON STEPHENSON

Finalist, Sixteenth Van Cliburn International Piano Competition



American pianist Clayton Stephenson's love for music is immediately apparent in his joyous charisma onstage, expressive power, and natural ease at the instrument. Hailed for "extraordinary narrative and poetic gifts" and interpretations that are "fresh, incisive and characterfully alive" (Gramophone), he is committed to making an impact on the world through his music-making.

Growing up in New York City, Clayton started piano lessons at age 7, and the next year was accepted into The Juilliard School's Music Advancement Program—a full scholarship program for under-represented students—where he lingered to watch student recitals and fell in love with music. He advanced to Juilliard's elite Pre-College at age 10—with the help of his teacher at

the time, Beth Nam, who gave him countless extra lessons without charge—to study with Matti Raekallio, Hung-Kuang Chen, and Ernest Barretta. Clayton practiced on a synthesizer at home until he found an old upright piano on the street that an elementary school had thrown away; that would become his practice piano for the next six years, until the Lang Lang Foundation donated a new piano to him when he was 17.

He credits the generous support of community programs with providing him musical inspiration and resources along the way. As he describes it, the "Third Street Music School jump-started my music education; the Young People's Choir taught me phrasing and voicing; Juilliard's Music Advancement Program introduced me to formal and rigorous piano training, which enabled me to get into Juilliard Pre-College; the Morningside Music Bridge validated my talent and elevated my self-confidence; the Boy's Club of New York exposed me to jazz; and the Lang Lang Foundation brought me to stages worldwide and transformed me from a piano student to a young artist."

Clayton graduated from the Harvard-New England Conservatory (NEC) dual degree program in spring 2023 with a bachelor's degree in economics at Harvard and a master's degree in piano performance at NEC under Wha Kyung Byun. And his accolades along the way have been bountiful: in addition to being the first Black finalist at the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition in 2022, he was named 2022 Gilmore Young Artist; 2017 U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts; Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist; Gheens Young Artist; and Young Scholar of the Lang Lang International Music Foundation.

Recent and upcoming highlights include concertos with the Houston and North Carolina Symphonies and Las Vegas Philharmonic; festival appearances at Grand Teton and Tippet Rise; recitals at venues including Fondation Louis Vuitton and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall; and collaborations with violinists Nikki and Timothy Chooi in Europe, Canada, and the United States. On the 69th United Nations Day, Clayton played with the International Youth Orchestra at the U.N. General Assembly Hall. He has been featured on NPR, WUOL, and WQXR, and appeared in the "GRAMMY" Salute to Classical Music" Concert at Carnegie Hall's Stern Auditorium..

LISA BASTIEN

On any given day, twenty floors above the bustling streets of New York City, Lisa Bastien's piano studio is abuzz with the joyous sounds of students making and learning about music. For over a quarter century, her home has served as a place where students of diverse ages, abilities, and interests have come to experience joy, discovery, growth, and a passion for music.

Lisa began piano lessons at the age of four in New Orleans, Louisiana, with her mother, Jane Smisor Bastien. While Jane instilled in Lisa a passion for teaching and her keen sense of pedagogy, it was her father, James Bastien that introduced Lisa to the repertoire of the masters and fueled her love of great piano literature.

Lisa went on to receive a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano Performance from Drake University where she studied with George Katz and her Master's degree in piano pedagogy from Arizona State University where she studied with Dr. Robert Roux. After completing her master's, Lisa and her husband Basil Hanss moved to New Orleans where she taught in the Preparatory Piano Department at Loyola University. They eventually settled in New York City and Lisa established her studio, teaching both private and group lessons in piano and theory.

It was also in New York that Lisa began a prolific career as a writer and composer. Lisa has co-authored over 100 piano books with her mother Jane and her sister Lori. Collectively, the Bastien family has authored over 500 hundred books that are translated into 14 languages and have taught millions of students how to play the piano. Lisa has clocked countless days, weeks, and months in planes, trains, and automobiles traveling around the globe to share the Bastien publications with other teachers at workshops and conventions worldwide.

Through it all, however, it was—and continues to be—Lisa's passion for excellence as a teacher, and her dedication to her students, that define her. Lisa cares deeply about the musical progress and personal growth of each individual student and finds great joy in the lifelong connections she has with her students and their families.

PHILLIP POWELL

Dr. Philip M. Powell is a Professor of Music and has been a faculty member at Coastal Carolina University since 1988, teaching piano, piano pedagogy and music history. Since moving to South Carolina, Dr. Powell has maintained an active performing schedule with concerts frequently heard on South Carolina Public Radio. In South Carolina, Dr. Powell has performed with the South Carolina Symphony Orchestra, the Jupiter Symphony and is a frequent soloist with the Long Bay Symphony, playing concerto repertoire ranging from Mozart to Gershwin. As a collaborative pianist, Powell has appeared with artists such as Kennedy Center Honors recipient Martina Arroyo, soprano; Ignat Solzhenitsyn, piano; Sungwon Yang, cello; David Jolley, French horn; Grammy nominated Tine Thing

Helseth, trumpet and Grammy nominated composer and flutist, Valarie Coleman. He has served as President of the Coastal Concert Association, Music Director of the Festival of Music and Art at Pawleys Island, founding Director of the Musicale de Geneve series and a member of the Board of Directors of the Litchfield Dance Arts Academy and of the Long Bay Symphony. In 2021, Dr. Powell was inducted into the Steinway "Teacher Hall of Fame," which serves as a tribute to the many outstanding mentors with whom Dr. Powell had the privilege to work. Dr. Powell holds the BMA from the University of Oklahoma, where he studied with Drs. Todd Welbourne and Edward Gates. He also attended the Aspen Summer Music Festival as a student of the late Edith Oppens. Dr. Powell holds a Masters of Music from Indiana University, where he was a student of both the late Karen Shaw and Shegio Neriki, and the Doctorate of Music also from Indiana University, where he was a student of the late Michel Block.

Topic: From Beginner to Concert Artist: Pedagogic Application of Steinway Technology to Teach, Learn and Inspire

The Steinway Spirio|r is a novel technology that has the potential to provide powerful pedagogic tools and resources for piano instruction, whether individual or group settings. In this presentation, we will explore three primary advantages for modern piano instruction: Recording, Listening and Sharing. The Steinway Spirio does not just record, but it reproduces EVERY nuance produced by the performer. Whether your student is putting hands together for the first time working out polyrhythms, exploring the gradations of pedaling or putting the finishing touches on competition repertoire, the ability to record, hear and analyze an acoustic version of their performance can be transformational. From the vast library available with the Spirio, listening to a variety of performances, from both living artists and artists of historic significance, is a unique tool in understanding and developing musical style and taste.

While COVID has forced acceptance of Distance Learning for applied music instruction, the sonic quality of ZOOM lessons has been universally frustrating. Perhaps the most exciting and unique features of the new Steinway Spirio technology is the possibility for distance learning with real-time acoustic sound production for both the student and the teacher. We will also explore the ability to link multiple pianos to have interactive instruction and music making, representing a quantum leap in the accessibility and quality of distance learning. This presentation will demonstrate the variety of ways that the technology available in the Steinway Spirio|r can expand our traditional pedagogic toolbox, reimagine technical approaches and share with students new and creative paths to refined musicianship.

DAN MCCURRY

Dan McCurry is a Piano and Music Composition teacher based in Charleston, SC. He started teaching piano independently shortly before graduating from College of Charleston, where he studied music composition under Dr. David Maves and Dr. Edward Hart, and jazz piano under the late Tommy Gill. Additionally, he is a piano faculty member at the private school Ashley Hall. He is an active member of the Charleston Music Teachers Association and Charleston Music Club, where he currently serves as President for both organizations. He is also an active



member of South Carolina Music Teachers Association, where he serves as the recently created Creativity In Music Chair. In this role he has helped the organization launch a statewide composition competition and recital, as well as a creativity workshop which featured composer Wynn-Anne Rossi in the inaugural year and will feature composer Mike Springer in January 2024. In the upcoming year, this initiative will expand to include a songwriting competition that will run alongside the composition competition with winners of both being featured in a joint recital. There will also be a companion songwriting workshop with notable singer-songwriter Michael Flynn of Slow Runner.

Dan first introduced teaching music composition to his students in 2019 and has since helped his students compose over 100 pieces. His students have received local, statewide, regional, and national recognition for their compositions in the MTNA Composition Competition, NFMC Junior Composers Contest, NFMC Lynn Freeman Olson Composition Awards, Piano Guild Composition Contest, Piano Explorer Magazine, South Carolina MTA Composition Competition, and the Charleston Sonatina Festival. His students have also attended the Brevard Composition Institute Summer Camp and have won scholarships for composition from Brevard, Charleston Music Club, and Charleston Symphony Orchestra League.

Topic: Student Creative Opportunities in SCMTA

SCMTA Creativity in Music Chair, Dan McCurry, will highlight all that SCMTA's new creativity initiative has to offer including workshops, competitions, and recitals. Guidelines for participation in the competitions will be reviewed and tips on how to coach students in these creative pursuits will be given. Examples of student entries will be presented through live performances by past competition participants.

Patrick Boyle began his career in music as a performing artist and has played piano throughout the British Isles and on both coasts of the United States. Patrick now calls Charleston, SC home and has performed solo and chamber music in a variety of venues in the area. Additionally, Patrick is also an enthusiastic collaborator and is dedicated in particular to sharing contemporary music. He is a founding member of the Charleston Eclipse Ensemble and regularly collaborates with other musicians across a variety of genres and mediums. Patrick has performed on the piano

alongside ballet dancers, with jazz combos and big bands, choirs, and has even enjoyed music-directing musicals.

In the course of working as a musician, Patrick discovered a passion for teaching piano. He has served as faculty in performance and theory at Boston College, but enjoys working with students of all ages, levels, and backgrounds. Patrick is currently a member of MTNA, SCMTA, and serves on the Executive Board of the Charleston MTA. He presently teaches out of his home studio and at the Charleston Academy of Music.

Patrick received a Bachelors in History and in Music at Boston College, and a Masters in Music at the Longy School of Music. Over the course of nearly 20 years of teaching and performing, he has watched the music-teaching industry evolve. Patrick was honored to be named the SCMTA Teacher of the Year in 2022 and is constantly working with new tools and methods to adapt his teaching to a changing world.

Topic: Artificial Intelligence (AI): A World of Opportunity for the Music Studio

Independent Music Teacher (IMT) Chair Patrick Boyle will briefly discuss how artificial intelligence is impacting the private music studio, and will preview opportunities for teachers to interact with artificial intelligence tools throughout the rest of the conference. Later in the conference, teachers will be asked to compare their pedagogical knowledge against that of a large language model (LLM) AI and will have the opportunity to play with a few AI tools that can be used in the music studio.

Leonard Mark Lewis, born in Great Yarmouth, England, in 1973 and raised in Houston, Texas, is a composer and pianist specializing in new music. His vocal works include a chamber opera, Wake Lucia, A Joycean Operatic Rite, and a catalog of celebrated art songs. He is an avid collaborator and has worked with choreographers and dance companies throughout the United States and abroad. He has received commissions and performances from the Charlotte Symphony, Rock Hill Symphony, American Composer's Orchestra, North/South Consonance, AURA, Symposium for New Band Music, New Music Camerata, NACUSA, Concordia Trio, Hyperion Ensemble, Rhodora Trio, Duo Amizade, New Century Quartet; soloists Kenneth Tse (saxophone), Alan Black (cello), James Dick (piano), Brian Utley (saxophone), and Benjamin Geller (viola), Leonardo Soto (per-



cussion), Thomas Burge (trombone/euphonium), among many others. His concerti include works for percussion (Evolution, for Leonardo Soto), viola (Vast Skies, for Ben Geller), and saxophone (Concerto for Saxophone, for Kenneth Tse). Other major artists have performed his Concerto for Saxophone, including Steve Ticknor (President's Own), Nate Nabb, and Tracy Patterson, who performed the work at Carnegie Hall. His viola concertino, Weeping, an Angel. Immense has recently received performances with the Charlotte Symphony, Rock Hill, Symphony, and North/South Consonance, NYC. The Charlotte Symphony has also recently premiered his cello concerto, I Will Wade Out, Alan Black, soloist.

Lewis, a Professor of Music at Winthrop University, is the recipient of awards including ASCAP, B.M.I., Columbia University (Bearns Prize), and Voices of Change. SCMTA Teacher of the Year



SCOTT PRICE

Dr. Scott Price currently serves as Carolina Distinguished Professor of Music, and Coordinator of Piano Pedagogy at the University of South Carolina School of Music. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, The Cleveland Institute of Music, and Bowling Green State University (OH), his recent engagements have included repeated invitations and performances and clinics at the national conventions of the Music Teachers National Association, the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, The Royal Conservatory of Music Professional Development Seminars, and solo recitals and presentations throughout AK, AL, AR, AZ, CA, CT, FL, GA, HI, IL, IN, KS, KY, LA, MD, MI, MN, MO, MS, MT, NC, ND, NE, NH, NJ, NM, NV, NY, OH, OK, OR, PA, SC, TN, TX, UT, WA, WI, WV, VA, and Washington

DC. Other engagements include performances, masterclasses, and lectures for organizations in Australia, Brazil, Canada, Malaysia, Spain, Thailand, Singapore, and in South Korea. Dr. Price is the creator and served for 23 years as editor-in-chief of the on-line piano pedagogy journal "Piano Pedagogy Forum." "Piano Pedagogy Forum" published more than 30 issues with participation from more than 100 writers from 84 different colleges/universities, over 28 different states and three foreign countries. The Music Teachers National Association named "Piano Pedagogy Forum" as the recipient of the 2008 Frances Clark Keyboard Pedagogy Award. Dr. Price has recorded 39 full length recordings of educational piano music for Alfred Publishing Company and has published educational compositions with Alfred Publishing Company and the FJH Music Company. In addition, he created "The Inclusive Teaching Course" for The Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy, the first comprehensive online course for piano teachers who wish to include students with autism and other special needs in their piano studios. Dr. Price is a member of the Committee on Special Needs Students for the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, served three terms as President of the Board of Trustees of The Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy, and currently serves as chair of Collegiate Chapters for the South Carolina Music Teachers Association. Special teaching interests of Scott Price include teaching students with disabilities, very young children, and teaching keyboard improvisation to piano students ranging from beginning to advanced levels. His work with students with special needs has been featured on WISTV (SC) and WLTX (SC), and in Clavier Companion Magazine. One of Dr. Price's students with autism was featured on Dateline NBC, and CNN. His collegiate students have performed with the University of South Carolina Symphony, have presented at conferences throughout the world, and have been winners of the Article of the Year awards from The American Music Teacher journal, and the Music Teachers National Association eJournal. In addition, he has directed 41 doctoral dissertations and seven master's degree theses. Dr. Price is the founder of the Carolina LifeSong Initiative that is dedicated to providing piano lessons and music experiences for students with special needs, and in fostering best practices in teaching and teacher training. His book "Autism and Piano Study: A Basic Teaching Vocabulary" and two sets of "Evocations" for piano students were published in 2023 by Tom Gerou Music. He has been awarded the "Best of BGSU Outstanding Graduate" alumnus award from Bowling Green State University in Ohio in 2002 and was named a Foundation Fellow by the Music Teachers National Association in 2009. He is the 2012 recipient of the Southeastern Conference Faculty Achievement Award for the University of South Carolina. Dr. Price is a 2019 recipient of the Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy Outstanding Service Recognition Award, the 2023 Distinguished Alumnus Award from The Cleveland Institute of Music, and in 2020 he was recognized as a Carolina Distinguished Professor - the highest recognition given to a faculty member by The University of South Carolina.



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
